ASSEMBLY UPDATE December 13, 2020

### Administration Actions this Week

No emergency action this week.

### **COVID-19 Data Snapshot**

Update as of 10:05 a.m. on December 13, 2020:

### Ten new deaths reported yesterday. Eight from death certificate review and two recent. Cumulative deaths: 98

### 14-day case rate average per 100k people: 88.55 (an increase of 1.42 from yesterday and a decrease of 0.37 from Friday.)

Context: Averaging the per capital incidence of COVID-19 over 14 days reduces the influence of day-to-day fluctuations in the number of cases identified in a community.

## 7-day test positivity rate (with 7-day test reporting lag) 6.82 as of 12/6 (a decrease of 0.08 from yesterday and 0.12 from Friday.)

Context: The test positivity rate is simply the fraction of tests that come back positive. A low positivity rate suggests that sufficient tests are being conducted to detect a high proportion of current cases. According to the World Health Organization, the test positivity rate from a comprehensive testing program should be at or below 5% for at least 14 days before relaxing restrictions or beginning to reopen.

Current COVID-19 hospitalizations: 77 confirmed cases and 4 PUIs (an increase of 1 confirmed case and a decrease of 1 PUI from yesterday. A decrease of 2 confirmed cases and a decrease of 4 PUIs from Friday.) Context: Hospitalizations provide a measure of more serious disease and is less affected by fluctuations in testing. Hospitalizations may be affected both by local cases and by remote cases transferred in to Anchorage from communities lacking sufficient hospital capacity.

# Anchorage staffed adult ICU Beds Available: 4 ICU beds out of a possible 73 staffed adult ICU beds (a decrease of 2 available ICU beds and 3 possible staffed adult ICU beds from yesterday. A decrease of 2 available ICU beds and no change in possible staffed adult ICU beds from Friday.)

Context: Availability of ICU beds is an important measure of health care capacity. This count is based on General Acute Care and Critical Access facilities in Anchorage. The denominator may vary depending on staffing considerations. The number of ICU beds in use may be affected both by local cases and by remote cases transferred in to Anchorage from communities lacking sufficient ICU capacity.

### Total resident cases to date, in and out of state: 20,035 (300 new cases reported today and 224 reported yesterday.)

Context: Most cases only remain infectious for 10 days. Individuals may experience health effects of COVID-19 after they stop being infectious.

### Economic Relief/CARES Act Distribution Update

### Rent and Mortgage Relief

As of 11:00 a.m. on December 11: 12,270 housing payments have been made, with \$11,500,412.07 expended.

United Way has been processing rental relief payments through direct outreach to landlords. As a result of the additional funding appropriated by the Assembly, 2-1-1 will begin accepting applications again from individual renters/homeowners beginning on Monday, December 14.

#### Voucher/Gift Card Program

As of 12:00 p.m. Sunday, December 13: nearly 24,000 applications.

### Hospitality Relief Grants

<u>For hospitality businesses with liquor licenses</u>: 397 applications received, 333 eligible to receive grants from the list of 376 known licensees. Of the 43 that did not apply, it is due to being permanently closed, ownership (or parent company) is publicly traded, or just chose to not apply for one reason or another even after exhaustive attempts and outreach from our team. 333 grants awarded leaves \$602,000 to carry forward for Round 2 funding.

<u>For hospitality businesses without liquor licenses</u>: there is a greater lag between applications being approved and checks being disbursed for this program, so as of November 20 there has been \$1,274,000 disbursed to 182 businesses with \$1,876,000 remaining.

<u>Hospitality worker support</u>: Anchorage Downtown Partnership, Ltd. has partnered with CHARR, AKHR, and Brewer's Guild of Alaska to provide support to our hospitality employees and their families this holiday season through a gift card campaign. Gift cards can be dropped off downtown at the Hotel Captain Cook or tax-deductible can be made at <u>Donations to Support Anchorage Hospitality Employees</u>.

### COVID-19 Peer Leader Navigator (CPLNs) Program

Since the end of September, CPLNs have helped 461 individuals access services and information in 66 unique, countable ways. The top four topics CPLNs are helping their peers with are food supplies, health information, rent and mortgage assistance, child care/K-12 education, employment, and public assistance. More than seventy five (75) percent of CPLN support is done in a language other than English including Amharic, Arabic, Dinka, Korean, Nuer, Russian, Samoan, Somali, Spanish, and Tongan.
